sessions and symposia on lesbian and gay concerns in law enforcement, military discrimination, anti-gay and anti-lesbian violence, gay and lesbian families and parenting, psychological dimensions of HIV/AIDS, and gender role issues. It will also include a workshop on integrating lesbian issues into the curriculum, as well as symposia on future lesbian and gay research directions and on clinical assessment and treatment issues.

Besides being diverse in the topic areas which make up this year's Convention Program, the upcoming Annual Meeting will also promote interdisciplinary understanding and collaboration by featuring two invited speakers from allied social science disciplines. Dr. Walter L. Williams, a distinquished anthropologist and Pulitzer Prize nominee for his book (*The Spirit and the Flesh: Sexual Diversity in American Indian Culture*) will speak on "Cross Cultural Understanding of Male Homosexuality: Implications for American Psychology." Dr. Lillian Faderman, a renowned professor and dynamic speaker who has written extensively on lesbian history (e.g., *Odd Girls and Twilight Lovers*) will speak on "the Social Construction of Lesbianism."

This year will be the second year in which Division 44 will host a hospitality suite. This hospitality suite will be located at the Westin Bonaventure Hotel (please check with the "Division Services" booth at the LA. Convention Center or with the Hotel for the suite number when you arrive for the Convention). Our hospitality suite will operate from 3:00 p.m. on August 12 (Friday) until noon on August 14 (Monday). Please see the complete hospitality suite program August 12 (Friday), a "Women's Party" on August 13 (Saturday), and a "Men's Party" on August 14 (Sunday). The hospitality suite will also have information available on the many resources in Los Angeles which serve the lesbian and gay community. Moreover, the suite will pilot a "RestauranTour" program this year to match Division 44 members and friends (especially local ones) who are willing to share their local favorite culinary establishments in Los Angeles with out-of-towners. Sign-up sheets for these Saturday and Sunday evening no-host dinner groups will be available at the hospitality suite.

Save the evening of August 15 (Monday) for a truly memorable event. A Division 44 fundraising dinner and dance is presently being planned at the private home of a local psychologist in Hollywood Hills. It promises to be a funfilled evening in addition to contributing to good cause. Details will be available at the hospitality suite during the Convention.

## Swimming Pools and Movie Stars: An Insider's Guide to the City of Angels

So you've made it through a day of programs and symposia and still have some energy? Hollywood insures a great time as long as you've got the Avis and the inclination. Gay L.A. sprawls in all directions: Studio City to the north, Long Beach to the south, Silverlake to the east, and West Hollywood ... well, West. Whatever your direction (or inclination) you can find it in Los Angeles.

### "<u>Where They Really Make Movies</u>"

You'll find Studio City's social scene mingling among storefronts and car dealerships. Actors and studios abound (Universal, Warners, CBS to name a few). *Oil Can Harry's* (11502 Ventura Blvd.) offers Country Dance Lessons (Thursday at 8). It's a great way to kick-start your evening: Cowpoke and Cowgal friendly, the open dancing starts at 9. The rest of Studio City's watering holes are close by: Young men, go west to the *Apache* (11608 Ventura Blvd.) where the men wear Polos and danceto Boy George. A little farther down the beaten path is *Oasis* (11916 Ventura Blvd.): The piano bar attracts the 40's+ crowd. Women, hop in your car and head up Lankershim to *Club 22* (4882 Lankershim) for a night of Latin action. Everyone must finish the festivities by getting a piece (of pie) at *DuPars* (12036 Ventura Blvd.): The waitresses are pure "kitsch" and this greasy spoon was Rock Hudson's hangout (no lie).

### LA's Gayest Beach Community:

Home of the biggest Queen around (the ship, Mary), Long Beach is 45 minutes down the 710 Freeway and well worth the voyage. *Ripples* (5101 E. Ocean Blvd.) is as pretty as its clientele: it overlooks the Pacific Ocean and the inside scenery is just as swell (especially during Sunday Beer Bust). The rest of the row is docked along Broadway. West to East (1800 E. - 740 E. Broadway): *Birds of Paradise* (restaurant/Piano bar), *Brit* (neighborhood), *Mineshaft* (cruisy/pool), *In Cahoots* (new/ neighborhood), and *Aria* (trendy/dancing). Women, cross the stream to *Club Broadway* (3348 E. Broadway) or ship out to *Floyd's* (2913 E. Anaheim St.) on Fridays for the country side of cool (guys need to check this place out Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays).

### Tales of the City with a Leather Twist:

Welcome to Silverlake. *Gauntlet II* (4219 Santa Monica Blvd.) is famous for "rough trade" and rougher times. If you have attitude, and the moustache to prove it, you're home. *Detour* (1087 Manzanita) is the Disney version of the aforementioned (in the city where Disney Studios once stood). *Circus of Books* (8230 Santa Monica Blvd. & 4001 W. Sunset Blvd.) is famous for more than just magazines and, for those even more curious, go to *King of Hearts* (1800 Hyperion) but *please* be careful. If you like tatoos, motorcycles and muscle boys who grew up, you'll like Silverlake.

### WeHo: At the Center of it All:

World famous, West Hollywood offers it all. As you head west on Santa Monica Boulevard, *The Pleasure Chest* is a sort of "museum of sexuality" and well worth the stop if only to wonder "What's that used for?" or gawk at the business-suit crowd that sneaks in.... Across the street, *Spike* (7746 Santa Monica) is known for its beer-drinking hunks.

Working west, *Capone's* (8277 Santa Monica) is a nice eatery with a bar known for its younger/older atmosphetre. Try *La Fabula* (7953 Santa Morica) -for two for one dinners on Wednesday and killer Tea Dances on alternating Sunday Afternoons. Another Tex Mex favorite is *Marix* (1108 N. Flores) where margueritas can be sipped on the patio.... *Marks* (861 N. La Cienega) is the nicest of the bunch, while the newcomer *Chit Chat* (8338 W. 3rd) is more fun than 976 (there's phones on every table so you can flirt while waiting for your food.) Women can drink expresso and talk at *Little Frida's Coffee House* (8730 Santa Monica) or sway to the music at *Palms* (8572 Santa Monica Blvd.).

The main area of West Hollywood is between San Vicente and Doheny, on Santa Monica Blvd. Open any door and you'll be welcome. Sunday Beer Bust at *Mother Lode* (8944 Santa Monica Blvd.) is a feel good time, and *Revolver* (8851 Santa Monica Blvd.) has video theme nights ....Axis (652 N. La Peer -the former *Studio One*) can't hold a downbeat to its predecessor, but still offers WeHo's biggest dance floor and hosts *Girl Bar* in the back on Fridays. *Rage* (8911 Santa Monica Blvd.) has been holding court for the S & M (Stand & Model) crowd since the early 80's.... Before you hit the road, *The Abbey* (692 N. Robertson) or *The Stx Gallery Cafe* (8861 Santa Monica Blvd.) can supply the caffeine and community spirit that put this city on the map.

## Not Officially Gay but a Good Place to Spend the Day

Driving is the primary mode of transport in IA and one can easily spend a few hours driving to the star's homes. You can get a map from any vendor along Sunset Boulevard in Beverly Hills. Shopping on Rodeo Drive is some of the finest in the city. For a mail experience with a noticible gay presence, try the Beverly Center in West Hollywood. Universal Studios offers a tour (and has evening hours for the summer) as do many of the other studios. Disneyland is a short ride south to Anaheim. Knotts Berry Farm is next door to the "Happiest Place on Earh." Mann's Chinese, in the center of Hollywood,still has the footprints of the famous and the sidewalk in front still (in spite of construction) has stars. For a wonderful evening under real stars, visit the Hollywood Bowl. Concerts in the open air amphitheater are an IA Summer tradition and cheap seats are almost always available. Be sure to take a "carry-out" dinner and a bottle of wine. The Universal Ampitheater (at Universal Studios) offers a full concert season as does the Greek Theater. If you are in a museum mood, there's the IA County Museum of Art, The Museum of Contemporary Art, and the Temporary Contemporary (which has been "temporary" forever). If dinosaurs are your thing, there's the La Brea Tar Pits. A short bop from the pits is Farmer's Market, filled with restaurants, fruit stands and IA locals. Breakfast time here is the best and you never know who from CBS (next door) you might see. IA threater still goes on in spite of Sunset Boulevard's closure, mostly at smaller theaters. Best best is to check out the listings in the LA Weekly, a free weekly newspaper. This is Southern California, and while the heach is a bit of a drive on the freeway, it's well worth it. Will Roger's beach in Santa Monica has a gay section. Venice Beach is best known for its carnival atmosphere on the boardwalk. And Laguna Beach, about an hour and a half away from downtown LA, is quaint, charming and a great place to go when the Convention ends.
